LIBERAL ARTS / ECOSYSTEMS, SUSTAINABILITY, & JUSTICE



Carissa Aoki received her PhD from the Ecology, Evolution, Ecosystems, and Society program at Dartmouth College, MS in Forest Sciences from Colorado State University, and BA in Women's Studies from Yale University.

Carissa is an applied ecologist working at the intersection of landscapes, disturbance and risk, particularly in forest ecosystems, and more recently on the working clam flats of coastal Maine. She has also collaborated with social science colleagues on issues related to urban forest ecology in Baltimore. As an instructor, she is particularly interested in bringing anti-racist principles to the teaching of science, including the use of interdisciplinary stories to bring non-traditional content into the curriculum.

Her interests in interdisciplinary research and teaching are grounded in her academic travels from humanist to scientist. She is interested in the languages and knowledges of the disciplines and the ways in which practitioner knowledges speak to those within academia. This has led her to projects focused on translating research into usable tools for resource managers and the general public, including collaborations with the web development teams from the DALI Lab at Dartmouth College.

Alec Armstrong received his PhD in Marine, Estuarine, and Environmental Sciences from the University of Maryland, College Park and the University of Maryland Center for Environmental Science. He received a BS in Environmental Science from The Ohio State University.

Alec is an ecologist and environmental scientist with teaching experience at St. Mary's College of Maryland and the University of Maryland, College Park. His research has focused on streams and wetlands, including work on organic matter biogeochemistry and carbon cycling relevant to water policy and ecosystem restoration. He has also studied farm soils, forests, estuaries, and the ocean. Alec's research and training emphasize field observations and laboratory experiments. He worked for the National Socio-Environmental Synthesis Center prior to joining MICA, developing educational materials and assisting the Center's Director. Before turning to science he worked as dishwasher, cook, and farm laborer.

His interest in ecology and environmental science and their relevance to social justice began with volunteer work on bioremediation and building healthy soil in New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina. He has also contributed to efforts promoting education and writing in prisons, food justice, and urban gardening. Since 2019 he has volunteered as a tutor supporting college students inside Maryland prisons.

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Abraham Burickson

GRAPHIC DESIGN MFA



Abraham Burickson received an MFA in writing from the University of Texas Michener Center for Writers and a BA in Architecture from Cornell University.

Burickson is the Co-Founder of Odyssey Works and Co-Director of the Experience Design Certificate Program, and has spent more than two decades exploring the relationship between design and experience. His work over this time has defined a practice which unifies diverse art and design disciplines within a mode of making that prioritizes the experience over the thing. He has studied the transformative power of designed experience with the Whirling Dervishes of Turkey, the Shuar of the Ecuadorian Amazon, and with countless artists, designers, and students through Odyssey Works. He is also the founder of The Long Architecture Project, which rethinks architectural practice from the perspective of Experience Design. He has taught in graphic design, writing, interactive art, and architecture programs, and has won prizes, lectured widely, given a TEDxtalk, and was once hired by German television to kidnap an American skateboarding champion. His book: Odyssey Works: Transformative Experiences for an Audience of One, was published by Princeton Architectural Press in 2016. His book on Experience Design is forthcoming from Yale University Press in 2023.

Burickson joins the Graphic Design MFA program this year as the Lead Experience Design Faculty.
